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SPOTLIGHT INTERVIEW

Dr. Vikas Dhupar

Our childhood is a precious time in every human life. How was your childhood and Growing up? What were the instances that made you choose medicine as a profession?

My father was in the defence forces and I grew up all around the country. Every one and a half years, we moved. I probably changed nine schools before I completed my 12th. Going all around the country and seeing different parts of it was a big challenge. Everywhere you went, you met new people, new friends. Friends changed very quickly, and by the time you settled in a place, we had to change. This also helped in the sense that we went to some of the most remote places. Probably people growing up in cities wouldn't know about it, but those were the best places we stayed. We could see the country there. What I realized was that life is not just about life in the cities or in the big metros, but about how people struggle on a daily basis. But that really did not direct me into dentistry. Back then, there were only two things: either you become an engineer or you become a doctor. We really did not know what the world beyond that was. And of course, it was all dependent on your class 12th marks. Being in different places and changing so many schools, I may not have been able to score that well. But then an opportunity came. One day, my father told me that there was a quota for defence. Fortunately, I applied for that and got a seat in dentistry. At that time, I was wondering what dentistry was. It was not really well-known. I had an experience of getting an impacted canine removed, which took almost three and a half to four hours. I was admitted and given injections every couple of hours. So it was quite traumatic. That's how I developed an interest in dentistry. And of course, the place where I got was Goa, which everybody would want to be in. We always heard about the beaches there, and we never knew somebody could get educated in Goa. So that's how everything fell into place. That's why I think what it's probably called destiny.









So how was your journey in dentistry, and what inspired you to take up maxillofacial surgery, Sir?

When I came in, of course, joining the college itself was an experience. My father and mother showed us how to be very independent very early because we would be traveling all over, as I had already told. I just got one telegram in my hand, and I was told, "Just go find your college and get admitted." So I looked left and right and, with no help from anyone, I had to take a bus from Bangalore to Goa, trying to hunt for the college. When we reached the Medical College, they said, "No, the college is not here. It's in a different place." So that was one experience. Luckily, this was a very small class, a very

well-knit network of friends. There were very few teachers at the college at that time. There were no regulations. One of them, when I reached the clinics, was Dr. Vishal Mishra. He is a maxillofacial surgeon who really inspired me to join this branch. Back in the day, around '86-'87, he was one of the first to venture into cleft lip and palate and orthognathic surgery, which I think was remarkable. In this part of the country, you know, we had to operate in the Medical College. That also really inspired me. I managed to get the post of junior resident. Goa Medical College happens to be the oldest medical school in Asia, and the Department of Dentistry probably is the oldest department of dentistry in the country. When I joined as a junior resident, my Professor, Dr. Vishal Mishra, left the college. We were just two BDS students, and there were a remarkable number of trauma coming in. We really didn't



know what to do, so we would get in touch with the neurosurgeon or probably get in touch with the general surgeon and tell them, "Just stand by. We need to do some things." Of course, plating was not available. We used to do some wiring for patients. That really got me to join my next step, which was, of course, post-graduation. We didn't have post-graduation in our college, so we had to hunt for a seat. I applied to a couple of colleges and managed to get a postgraduate seat in Dental College at Belgaum. There, of course, my guide, Dr. Khera, a thorough gentleman, was one of the founding father of our association. He was pretty old at that time, and he wasn't coming to the college, but he inspired us to be a good human being and how to deal with your patients. So this is what he reinforced, and he gave us a free hand. Our training was a challenge, because there was no curriculum laid down at that time. There were supposed to be some seminars, but those days, it was a very difficult. Then I came across a couple of people, especially Brigadier C. Anand, who's no more with us. He was a doubly qualified person in Orthodontics as well as oral surgery. He would do a lot of orthognathic surgeries. He was posted in Pune, which was pretty close to Belgaum. Sometimes I would go from Belgaum to Pune to see some surgery. That's how I managed to learn, at least see, and understand what was happening at that time.

We've all been guided to be great surgeons and great human beings by our teachers and mentors. You did mention Dr. Khera, who mentored and inspired you. Who were the other important people and mentors in your life who you feel shaped it all out for you, even till now?


Dr. Vishal Mishra was the inspiration, and Dr. Khera was my guide. At that particular time in Belgaum, when we were there, Dr. P.S. Tandon had just joined the college. He had just graduated from Bangalore and come. He didn't also have much exposure, but he said, "Come on, let's read things together and do things together." So we took some critical steps at that time. We would go read and do certain surgeries. That's the way we went forward. But of course, I have already mentioned Dr. Anand and to some extent, Dr. Kishore Naik. Whenever I went home to Bangalore for holidays, I would just drop in at the hospital and see one or two surgeries. He was very encouraging. So these are the couple of people who have always taken me through the journey, but you know, to really say people holding your hand and walking you was a challenge at those times. That happens now, where people actually take you through, and it becomes much easier. But those times were different.



How do you see healthcare in India and the world changing over the decades, and what do you think we are heading into in the future?

I would say that healthcare has become very organized. It is not only organized in the bigger cities, but even in the Tier 2 and Tier 3 cities, where healthcare has become more organized. You know, there was a great discrepancy in treatment protocols or management, what used to happen in the West compared to what was happening in India. But I think we are on par at present with most of the Western countries as far as most types of treatment are concerned, except for sometimes the cutting-edge technology and equipment which, due to our financial constraints, may not be available. But the skills and talent we currently have, I think, are equal to or even better than most of the surgeons across the world. And technology, of course, is playing a very major role in our future because what happens is that learning is much easier and is much better documented, making it easier for a person to understand and transfer his knowledge to other people. With the help of audio and videos, recording live telecasts has become possible, and the amount of material available, which may be unverified on your social medias like YouTube, could give you ideas. If you are trying to perform a procedure, there would be some video or some knowledge available about it, which you could probably see and decide before taking a conscious decision on the procedures. You could manage teleconsultations easily for patients as well as for doctors. Forums are available where you could put up a case, and you will get multiple opinions on how to manage

your case. Technology has actually shrunk the world. So, this is what is really happening. Of course, with all these things, what has also come is that patients are very conscious at the present time about their requirements. As we are using technology, they too are using technology, and they also have preconceived ideas or make opinions before they visit. So there is a challenge there, where we need to at times debunk their opinions, get them onto the same platform as us before we manage them. The times are gone when whatever I can do with the patient, I do, the patient will accept it, and it will be okay. That is not the case. If you do not know something, it is better to refer a patient or call somebody who can help you out with that kind of surgery. It is important now to know your limitations and grow within those limitations, along with



the other people around you who are training, who are learning, and who are willing to share their knowledge with you. So, the overall scenario is that it is technology-driven. There are a lot of things which can be much easier for us, like patient-specific implants and the total joint replacements, which are coming up in a big way. It becomes much clearer to you how you're going to work on these patients. So overall, technology is the basis, and we have to be part of the technology. Otherwise, we're going to be left far behind in our practice.

What is your second love after maxillofacial surgery? What are your interests? What do you love to do?

Other than maxillofacial surgery, my parents encouraged us to travel, so travel is one of my passions. I definitely love it, and being here as the president of the association this year really gave me an opportunity to visit a lot of places. Another passion of mine is sports. The weekend is really a chance to unwind for the whole week, where it gives you a perspective. Sports like golf, you know, actually you play against yourself. This is what tells you how, you know, really, nobody monitors you. You don't have referees around you. And golf really lets you know your true self. Of course, you meet wonderful people with whom you spend a couple of hours on the course, and you really enjoy it. Other than that, I love spending time at home watching TV, watching a lot of the serials coming along, and spending time at home with my wife and my daughter. And of course, whenever I get the opportunity, I try to update my interests, which is also one of my interests, like photography. Travel helps in that, and I try to get more insight into things.

Which is the most challenging case you've handled so far and something which gave you that kind of happiness and satisfaction? Would you like to share some anecdotes about your journey throughout, whatever personal or professional, which were turning points in your life?

After I finished my masters, there was an opportunity for us in Goa, and I met my wife in Belgaum. So, we decided she got a job at Goa, back in the college, and then I followed her. I was the only person in the department, and I had two junior residents with me who were just fresh graduates. So there was a lot of enthusiasm to establish the department, do something more. We had a case of ameloblastoma. I wanted to resect it, and we reconstructed it with an iliac graft. I had two junior residents. Suddenly, you know, one of the girls who was assisting me at that time, fainted. So probably, I had the graft in one hand, and with the other hand, I had to hold her. Somehow we finished the surgery. But of course, those girls who were with me, they learned so well, and they were so competent by the time they finished their residency, it was amazing. The challenges would come up almost on a daily basis because I was in the Medical College, and Doctor Mishra had set up high standards before he left. Even a resident anaesthetist would be like all the time watching you and trying to judge you, you know, how you will perform, how you will manage, and that was the challenge all the time because you had to be on your toes and prove yourself to get acceptance. The kind of respect we get all around is because of those times, the challenges, which were small challenges which were coming every time, you know, maybe interpersonal challenges, challenges of taking a patient to the OT, preparing for the OT with your limited infrastructure available to you. But yes, we managed, and always, a step better than the expectations of most people. So that really



helped us to move forward. And of course, maxillofacial surgery. That's what is my passion. We had a case of bilaterally impacted molars in the ramus. We decided to split the mandible and take it out. We did both procedures and we did publish it, and it was way back in '95 in our journal. These situations we faced gave us the confidence to move forward and carry out complex procedures. And it was a very creative way. We went through it, it was like traumas, cleft lip and palate, and pathology, that's how we went one step at a time.

Moving forward, you grow and move forward.

What are your thoughts when you enter the OT and don the gloves? What should we focus on? And apart from the fact that we have to have the technical skill set, that is no excuse at all. What are the other soft skills that you feel we need to have to take care of our patients better?

Before donning the gloves itself, the whole procedure starts. When you are preparing the patient before you enter the theatre, it is the time when you know the surgery. I normally perform the surgery in my mind, what are the steps I'm going to take? What are the steps that keep playing like a video in my mind. And if I'm not very confident of any particular step, I just read, read it and try to bring it again in my mind, till that all starts playing. The thing is to keep a cool head, and



especially give confidence to all the people who are around you. And the most important part I have learned is, whenever we are operating, even if it is a first-year postgraduate, second-year postgraduate, sometimes they come up or they ask, "Why are you doing this? Could it be done in a different way? Or what is this you're doing?" you should have an open mind towards it. There may be something. Things can be done better. And this, you know, it's not that people around me have to be in absolute silence. I enjoy them giving comments to me.

No harm to the patient whatsoever. That is the mantra which you must keep in mind. They have come for treatment. It should not get worse from there, what you started off. Your contribution to our association AOMSI and the entire maxillofacial specialty worldwide as a leader has been immense. What are your challenges that you faced as the President of AOMSI, of course, this year, and other leadership posts that you've had in the past?

To start with, before I really became active in maxillofacial surgery, when I joined the department as a lecturer, I had to lead the department. We were a very small department with seven beds and now we have a big team. It's a really huge team I have right now. We have 50 people in the maxillofacial department with about 10 consultants with us. As a

student, we always attended conferences. One day I had a talk with Dr Kishore, and he said, "Why don't you have a conference in Goa?" So we were just three maxillofacial surgeons in Goa, and the first conference was held. One was scientific, one was the chairman, and another colleague was the Secretary, and that's how my association with maxillofacial surgery started. And we, the same team, has organized two national conferences, which is a rarity. And in the association, I have always been active. I also happened to be in the, the Dental Council of India at present and the Executive Committee member of the Dental Council of India. So I've been there for the last couple of years.



Streamlining the training program from the Council, has helped maxillofacial surgery, also giving us clarity on the practice of aesthetic by facial aesthetics by maxillofacial surgeons, including hair transplants. I made this happen with the help of other colleagues from the Council and our members. These probably are some small contributions which I made for the betterment of our profession. I always believe that unless you participate in a process, like an election to take up a post where you can make a difference. Being in the association has given a better insight to me to help and overcome small challenges. As the leader of the association, my idea has never been to impose myself on anybody. Always take everybody with you. The association is for everyone. Everybody should feel entitled about the association. So my endeavour this year was basically to make people feel entitled that it's their association. And we must work together, and we must grow together, facing all the challenges

Younger generations, like all of us, aspire to be as accomplished as you in every way. What legacy would you like to leave behind as a person? What is your vision for the future of the entire specialty in India as well as across the world?

My vision is the specialty is growing and there has to be specialization in each particular field. It's difficult, maybe in two or three cities' people may tend to do almost everything. But if you want to be well recognized, well-known, you will have to be specialized in a particular aspect of maxillofacial surgery. If somebody becomes better than me, I want to move away from that particular part of the surgery; particularly in oncology, we have a professor, we have a colleague with us who is doing it robustly there. So we can help him. We give him, give him her freedom for growth. Similarly, if anybody else who wants to take over your legacy should be such that people should do much better than what has been done by me. People should be guided as they develop, and people are extremely talented all around. So it's just a matter of time, when they pick up things. People should be the same. It is not that if I'm not there, the work will stop or anything will stop; the world continues everywhere. The patient care should continue even in your absence or when you retire. People should be able to do much better than what you have been able to offer to people.



After so many years of stint donning multiple hats as a leader, as a teacher, as a surgeon, seeing people day in and day out in everyday life, what do you think life is? How do you contemplate on this?

The wheels of life move very quickly. By the time you realize, some of us just focus on our profession and we forget real life. I think family life is the key to your developing well in the profession. Hadn't my wife given me the kind of support she had given, because she also herself is a professional, wouldn't be where I am today. But then I do realize that I could have spent much more time with my daughter because they move out so fast and so quick, 25-26 years disappear, which we do not realize. Also, we realize, when we really came through our times, that the world faced a lot of challenges in the last couple of years, which what happened was that the best came into us. And then again, we have forgotten about all of it. And then we have gone back to our own ways of life, as if nothing has happened and nothing can happen. But if you realize the wheels don't stop the phases




keep changing, and a particular phase of life will never come back to you. So it's important to enjoy your life at the best. Leave your work challenges and work. Try to differentiate between your personal life and your work life. I say that you need to enjoy the small things which the world has to offer you because you never know what is in it for you.

Lastly, what message would you like to give all our young Maxillofacial surgeons?

For the young maxillofacial surgeon, I would just like to say, be kind, do not judge, have respect for others. What has happened is that you don't come across the challenges what your seniors had. But I do not expect you also to come across those challenges. I would say focus on all around development. It will take time. Things take time, always but it's much shorter than your seniors. You have to have patience. What the youngsters do not have is the patience. They want the

world. They feel that because of this. You know so much of exposure to social media and other things. Look at your parents, they've also struggled. They've also tried their best and they've done things which are for your good and so many times they have put things across which you have not liked, but you never lose your patience with parents. As they have not lost their patience with you, and maybe after sometimes you understand what your parents are. Similar is the situation all around. Have empathy, have understanding what the other person is thinking or feeling because no two individuals are the same. Have a different viewpoint, try to accept a different viewpoint. That is the most important thing.
